One spring day, the Narrator of The Canterbury Tales rents a room at the Tabard Inn before he recommences his journey to Canterbury. That evening, a group of people arrive at the inn, all of whom are also going to Canterbury to receive the blessings of "the holy blissful martyr," St. Thomas à Becket.

The Prologue - CliffsNotes background In "The Prologue" of The Canterbury Tales, a group gathers at the Tabard Inn in Southwark, a town just south of London, to make a pilgrimage to the shrine of Saint Thomas à Becket at Canterbury. At the suggestion of the innkeeper, the group decides to hold a storytelling competition to pass the time as they travel.

The Prologue from The Canterbury Tales In the opening lines of the General Prologue, the narrator says that people go on pilgrimages to thank the martyr, who has helped them when they were in need (17–18). But Bailey (as the Host is later called) tells the group, "Ye goon to Caunterbury—God yow speede. / The blissful martir quite yow youre meede!" (769–770).

The General Prologue opens with a description of April showers and the return of spring. "Whan that Aprill with his shoures soote / The droghte of March hath perced to the roote," he begins, and writes about the burgeoning flowers and singing birds. The sun has gone through the second half of the zodiacal sign Aires, the "Ram."

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The arrangement of The Canterbury Tales was embraced not long after 1386 in which year Chaucer made and the Prologue to the Legend of Good Women. The Canterbury Tales was an assortment of 24 stories in stanza and writing. Chaucer bunch around the convivial host of the Tabard Inn 29 pioneers remembering himself of each class of society for England.
